The following story is to be used when undesignated gifts are brought for a gift exchange. Have those in attendance pick a gift and stand in a circle. The reader begins reading the story slowly, pausing at each WRIGHT/RIGHT and LEFT while gifts are passed accordingly. This has been enjoyed in some chapters for many years – they haven't tired of it yet and it's usually good for many laughs.
