As you recite the Objects and Aims at each meeting, do you think about the meaning behind those words? Let's take a few minutes and look at the Objects and Aims a little more closely. Elaine M. Swanson, CE, Nebraska, writes:

"P.E.O.'s statement of purpose speaks to our inner qualities and to striving to develop them more fully. It addresses attitudes, behavior and interacting with others." Our Founders, women of wisdom, recognized that strong character is vital to a woman's well being. To achieve true happiness and fulfillment, a woman must cultivate her inner qualities. I believe P.E.O. helps us to achieve this. Those who regard P.E.O. as a social organization and look no further miss much. True, strong bonds of friendship are forged and maintained within P.E.O., but our purpose transcends this by reminding each sister of her spirituality, which is the essence of character."

All members need to challenge themselves: this could mean becoming a chapter officer, presenting a program about a topic of interest to you, attending events in your community.

- 1. What types of programming has your chapter done which helped further your knowledge?
- 2. What do you do on a personal level to seek growth in knowledge and in culture?

And to radiate all light possible by conversation, by writing and by the right exercise of any talent we possess.

Each one of us has special talents that we can share with others. Some talents are more visible than others. All are equally valuable. P.E.O.s use their talents everyday at home, at work, in the community and within their chapters.

- 1. What talents are you willing to share with P.E.O.?
- 2. What talents are needed for each chapter officer and for each committee?

- 1. What does this sentence of the Objects and Aims mean?
- 2. What other words could you use to describe this goal?
- 3. Are these characteristics easy to accomplish?

The final paragraph of the Objects and Aims is a summary of how we can take the ideals of P.E.O. and use them in our own lives. We can accomplish this by doing the following:

1. List some examples.

This will include a sincere regard for our influence in the community, a careful consideration of feeling when speaking, and a determination to do all we can, at all times and under all circumstances to express a loving concern for each sister.

- 1. How are you involved in your community?
- 2. Are you always aware of how your words affect others?
- 3. Are you reaching your goals in life?

- 4. What is sisterhood?
- 5. How do you express a loving concern for each sister?

The Objects and Aims provide a road map for our chapters and our personal lives. Next time you recite it at a chapter meeting, think about the meaning behind the words. Are you meeting the challenges set forth in the Objects and Aims?
